

## Artist Bio: John Stano

Singer songwriter John Stano's sound is a distinctive blend of acoustic and slide guitar, stellar rack harmonica, expressive vocals and insightful songwriting developed over many years of performance and study. He sometimes adds a little mandolin or cigar box guitar to the mix as well. His style can be described as a combination of Folk, Americana and Blues. Initially self-taught, John went on to study American fingerstyle guitar at the Wisconsin Conservatory of Music and harmonica with national blues legend, Jim Liban. John received a B.A. in English and creative writing from U.W. Madison and a skillful use of language adds an original spark to his lyrics. 'Green Man Review' compared John's music to early Bob Dylan while 'Dirty Linen' was reminded of Country Joe McDonald. John also performs his own arrangements of folk and Americana artists such as Bob Dylan, Steve Earle, John Prine, Gillian Welch and Tom Waits; and country blues classics by artists including Robert Johnson, Mississippi John Hurt and Bukka White. John is a flexible and engaging performer who works regularly at a variety of indoor and outdoor venues. John has released four recordings of original music.
